#### MR FRANK RICHARDSON

It is with deep regret that we record the passing of the founder of our Society, Mr Frank Richardson.

After having been engaged in amateur stage work for 20 years, he formed a group of young people known as the Newcastle Youth Concert and Drama Society, which met in the old farmhouse at Clayton. He advertised for adults to join them to rehearse pantomimes, concerts and carnivals. The response led to the formation of the Newcastle Amateur Operatic Society, and he produced their first show 'Carousel' in the old Municipal Hall in 1965.

The success and enthusiasm of the members inspired him to take the young Society to the Gaumont Theatre, Hanley, for their next production and from then on they have continued in strength to the present Show, taking their place alongside the other already well established Societies in the area.

Frank Richardson died on 2nd July, 1977, but he will always be remembered with gratitude by all members of our Society.

"Orpheus
in
the
Underworld"

Offenbach's extremely funny operetta is <u>based</u> loosely on the ancient legend by Homer. The story opens in Thebes in Ancient Greece where Eurydice has fallen in love with a handsome shepherd Aristaeus (really Pluto, King of Hades in disguise). Her husband Orpheus bores her to distraction with his endless music and so she is only too willing to find solace elsewhere.

Pluto cunningly contrives that Eurydice is bitten by a snake, causing her to die (beautifully) only to be awakened by Pluto and carried off to sample the delights of Hades.

Orpheus is delighted when he discovers that Eurydice is gone, but Calliope his mother insists that he appeals to the Gods on Mount Olympus for her return, and arranges for their transportation in her balloon, piloted by Icarus, after a touching farewell from the pupils of Orpheus.

On Moun Olympus all is not as idyllic as one would expect, the Gods and Goddesses are rather resentful of Jupiter's attitude of "Do as I say not as I do" and they crave a little excitement. Then news arrives of the abduction of Eurydice and suspicion immediately falls on Jupiter, noted for his "affairs". Upset by these accusations, Jupiter orders Mercury to summon Pluto, a rather noted gay dog, to find out the truth. On his way Mercury passes Calliope and Orpheus en route to Olympus in their balloon.

When Pluto arrives, the Gods and Goddesses mount a full scale rebellion and order is only restored when Orpheus arrives to accuse Pluto. Jupiter orders Pluto to return Eurydice, and decides to go to Hades himself to see that Pluto obeys, taking all the heavenly bodies with him.

Alas, in Hades, Eurydice is rather disillusioned and bored as Pluto has confined her to a private room with only Styx, a deposed king, for company.

Arriving with Pluto, Jupiter takes a great fancy to Eurydice himself and whilst she is taking a bath, attempts to seduce her, disguising himself as a fly. His efforts meet with some success and he arranges to meet her at the party being held in his honour. While the party is in full swing Orpheus appears to claim Eurydice. Jupiter tells him that he may take her, but in ascending from Hades he must not look back. Oprheus agrees and all seems well, but Jupiter contrives to get him to turn and so he loses Eurydice.

The only problem left is - who gets Eurydice? Well you will have to wait for the finale to find the answer to that one!

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## REMEMBRANCE

#### **LESLIE C. B. THOMPSON 1907 - 1978**

The death of Tommy Thompson on Thursday 23rd February 1978 will leave a sad void in the lives of all who knew him. A native of Plymouth Tommy appeared in many Amateur productions in that town between the wars where he played many of the smaller character principal parts in the popular musicals of the day. During the Second World War Tommy was in the Tanks in Africa and Western Europe. After the war he went to work in Manchester where he was the guiding light of the then Pauldine Players, after removing to Newcastle Tommy became Prompter for Newcastle Amateur Operatic Society, a position he held until being taken ill just before Christmas 1977, except in 1976 when he appeared on stage in the role of the Chinese Firework Expert in the Midland Amateur Premier of THE GREAT WALTZ, during which I had the greatest of pleasure in presenting him with his NODA Long Service Medal and Gold Bar for 50 years service to the Amateur Stage.

**REV'D ERNEST R. ROE** the former Vicar of Cobridge, has been a Vice-President of the Society for the past 10 years, and so his death on Sunday 26th February shortly after returning from a visit to relatives in Australia and New Zealand came as a shock for those who knew him as an active and industrious worker for the Society, especially during Show week, when he was always on hand to show patrons to their seats with a friendly and helpful word.

We would like to extend our sympathy to Terry Yates in the sad loss of his wife. Joan was a loyal member of the Society for many years, despite her continued illness; she will be sadly missed.

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
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
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
