- Scene 4. Box Office on foredeck. Three weeks later.
- Scene 5. Auditorium and stage during performance that night.
- Scene 6. The top deck. Later that night.
- Scene 7. The levee at Greenville. Next morning.

Act I

- Scene 1. The Midway Plaisaunce, Chicago World's Fair, 1893.
- Scene 2. A room on Ontario Street, 1904.
- Scene 3. Rehearsal Room, Trocadero Music Hall. A few days later.
- Scene 4. St. Agatha's Convent. About the same time.
- Scene 5. Trocadero Music Hall. New Year's Eve ringing in the year 1905.
- Scene 6. Stern of the Show Boat 1927.
- Scene 7. Top deck of the "Cotton Blossom". That night.
- Scene 8. Levee at Greenville. The next night.

Magnolia & Gaylord Ravenal

Magnolia

Daughter of Andy and Parthy, she idolises Julie, the leading lady on the Show Boat and wishes only to follow in her footsteps; only that is, until she meets and falls in love with Ravenal, but fate sees that she also takes Julie's place on the stage.

Gaylord Ravenal

A riverboat gambler who by chance, becomes the leading man with the Cotton Blossom troupe. His direct approach sweeps Magnolia off her feet and much against Parthy's will the couple are married. Later on in Chicago gambling debts catch up with him and he leaves Magnolia to bring up their daughter Kim on her own.

Cap'n Andy

A brash, rumbustious extrovert, determined to enjoy life to the full. Typical of the "Barnstorming" American showmen of the late nineteenth century, his "Barn" is "Cotton Blossom" a big Mississippi riverboat, travelling the river, stopping off to entertain the folks in the newly settled townships.

Parthy Ann Hawks

Just as determined that he should not enjoy life is Parthy, his wife. Her two aims in life... to keep Cap'n Andy on the straight and narrow and to see their daughter assume a decent station in life away from the 'vulgarities' of showbusiness. She succeeds in neither ambition.

Queenie and Joe


Queenie

Joe's long suffering spouse, the cook for the Cotton Blossom. Typically full of life and energy, she helps to sell the show to the coloured folk with her rousing "Ballyhoo".

Joe

The odd job man on the boat who, according to Queenie, is shiftless and good for nothing but 'her man just the same'! He is, in his own way quite a philosopher and with a keen insight knows that whatever else happens in life "Ol' Man River will always keep rollin on".

Background to Showboat

Possibly one of the most influential musicals of the twentieth century SHOWBOAT combined the talents of Jerome Kern and Oscar Hammerstein II, both of whom had felt for some time that the Broadway musical theatre was suffering from a lack of depth and that something was needed to steer it away from the lightweight musical comedies and rather dated melodramatic operettas which were its staple diet. They chose for their subject Edna Ferber's novel of life on the Mississippi, which gave them the opportunity of dealing with issues such as unhappy marriages and racial prejudice.

The story which spans almost fifty years, deals primarily with the fortunes of the impressionable young Magnolia Hawks, whose father, Captain Andy Hawks, owns a showboat, "The Cotton Blossom", and a troubled riverboat gambler turned actor named Gaylord Ravenal. Magnolia and Ravenal fall in love while acting together on the showboat and eventually marry and move to Chicago. They separate, however, after Gaylord loses all of their money gambling. A subplot involves Magnolia's friend, Julie La Verne, who is of mixed race. Julie, a singer on "The Cotton Blossom" falls foul of the harsh laws of the Southern states because of her marriage to leading man Steve.

SHOW BOAT opened at the Ziegfield Theatre on December 27th 1927 and ran for 572 performances and has since had many revivals.



Julie and Steve


Julie


