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
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PRESIDENT'S & CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

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

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The Story of "Orpheus in the Underworld"

Offenbach's extremely funny operetta is based loosley on the ancient legend by Homer. The story opens in Thebes in Ancient Greece where Eurydice has fallen in love with a handsome shepherd Aristaeus (really Pluto, King of Hades in disguise). Her husband Orpheus bores her to distraction with his endless music and so she is only too willing to find solace elsewhere.

Pluto cunningly contrives that Eurydice is bitten by a snake, causing her to die (beautifully) only to be awakened by Pluto and carried off to sample the delights of Hades.

Orpheus is delighted when he discovers that Eurydice is gone, but Calliope his mother insists that he appeals to the Gods on Mount Olympus for her return, and arranges for their transportation in her balloon, piloted by Icarus, after a touching farewell from the pupils of Orpheus.


On Mount Olympus all is not as idyllic as one would expect, the Gods and Goddesses are rather resentful of Jupiter's attitude of "Do as I say not as I do" and they crave a little excitement. Then news arrives of the abduction of Eurydice and suspicion immediately falls on Jupiter, noted for his "affairs". Upset by these accusations, Jupiter orders Mercury to Summon Pluto, a rather noted gay dog, to find out the truth. On his way Mercury passes Calliope and Orpheus en route to Olympus in their balloon.

When Pluto arrives, the Gods and Goddesses mount a full scale rebellion and order is only restored when Orpheus arrives to accuse Pluto. Jupiter orders Pluto to Return Eurydice, and decides to go to Hades himself to see that Pluto obeys, taking all the heavenly bodies with him.

Alas, in Hades, Eurydice is rather disillusioned and bored as Pluto has confined her to a private room with only Styx, a deposed king, for company.

Arriving with Pluto, Jupiter takes great fancy to Eurydice himself and whilst she is taking a bath, attempts to seduce her, disguising himself as a fly. His efforts meet with some success and he arranges to meet her at the party being held in his honour. While the party is in full swing Orpheus appears to claim Eurydice. Jupiter tells him that he may take her, but in ascending from Hades he must not look back. Orpheus agrees and all seems well, but Jupiter contrives to get him to turn and so he loses Eurydice.

The only problem left is - who gets Eurydice? Well you will have to wait for the finale to find the answer to that one!
